Codes of conduct for the electoral proces: Jurado Nacional de Elecciones in Peru is considering developing a policy or a code of conduct for elections and they are now looking for the experiences of other EMBs related to this. The focus is thus on policies or codes of conduct (as opposed to international treaties, conventions, constitutions or laws) developed by EMBs for other stakeholders (as opposed to policies or codes of conduct developed by e.g. political parties or media or NGOs or others to guide their own actions) to guide the actions of several different stakeholders related to the electoral process (election day and beyond). ... read more »




